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Supporting Your Child's Revision

1. Getting Them in the Right Frame of Mind

The prospect of GCSE exams is very stressful for students. This tends to spark a natural 'fight, flight or freeze' response. When presented with the prospect of revision for exams, students may respond with;

- Fight: Students may become argumentative or aggressive
- Flight: Students may look to put off revision or run away from the problem
- Freeze: Students may panic and be unable to think straight or concentrate

If any of these instincts are triggered it becomes very difficult for the students to revise. To counteract this, try the following:

- Be unerringly positive: repeatedly focussing on the positive, emphasising belief that the student will be successful.
- Don't join in the anxiety even if you feel it! Try to remain calm and positive.

2. Planning Revision

Included in this document is a specific subject revision guide from all subjects on how to break down revision week by week running up to exams. In year 11, your child will receive a personalised intervention timetable for before and after school sessions run by staff. It is vital that your child attends these sessions. It is crucial that students start early and draw up a revision plan and timetable to make sure they cover all topics in plenty of time, avoiding any last minute panic.

Example revision timetables and blank templates are attached to this document and will be placed on the school VLE (Teams) to download.

3. How to revise

Many students fall into the trap of 'revising' by reading through notes while watching TV. To revise effectively students need a calm, peaceful environment. A little light background music can be conducive to concentration, however, mobile phones, TV and loud music have been shown to have a negative impact.

All students are individuals, and many often find their own preferred style of revision. However, just reading through notes has been shown to be highly ineffective. Students need to process and interact with the information in order to maximise retention. A quick internet search reveals that there are lots of methods. On the next following pages are details of just a few.

A - Learning by Rote

Most subjects will have certain facts that students simply must know. Rather than just re-reading and attempting to memorise, actively processing the information is more effective.

Try the say / cover / write method:

- · Read the information, say it out loud
- Cover it with your hand
- Write it out from memory

Repeat until you are able to reproduce the information perfectly.

Mnemonics can really help. We probably all recall learning the rainbow colours as Richard Of York Gave Battle In Vain. Lots of subjects will have similar mnemonics, or a student can easily make up their own personal mnemonic. e.g.

B - Summarising Information

Try summarising a passage of text 500 words long in around 200 words. Then try summarising it down to 50 words. Can you fit the key information on a flash card? Can you then take the flash card and re-expand the information?

Try turning a passage of text into a diagram. e.g.

At the end of the day try re-capping and summarising 5 things you have learned that day.

The atmosphere

The Earth's atmosphere is just a thin layer around the planet, fading gradually into empty space above. At a height of 50 kilometres, the pressure it can exert is only about one-thousandth of that at sea level.

Each layer of the atmosphere surrounds the globe, so we call them all 'spheres' – starting from the bottom they are the troposphere, stratosphere, mesosphere and thermosphere. There is also an important ionosphere


The troposphere is the lowest level, where the air is warmed by the ground, which in turn is warmed by the Sun. Further from the ground there is less heating effect, so temperature falls in the troposphere as height above ground increases. It is in the troposphere that clouds form, and there are upwards and downwards movements of air relating to complex weather patterns.

Aeroplanes that fly high can get as far as the stratosphere, which starts where the troposphere ends, about 12 killometres, above sea level. The ozone layer that absorbs UV radiation from the Sun, and protects is from harm, is part of the stratosphere.

The mesosphere starts is the next layer up, starting at about 50 km above the Earth's surface. When you see a 'shooting star' flash across the sky and then fade away then you are watching a meteor. That's a grain of dust, or occasionally something bigger, getting very, very hot as it collides with molecules of air in the mesosphere.

At the highest levels of the atmosphere, above 80 kilometres, and up to about 120 kilometres, in the thermosphere, incoming radiation and energetic particles from the Sun heat the air directly. They can make the thermosphere very hot – as much as 1500 °C.


One effect of the radiation and streams of particles is to IODISE, the thin air of the upper atmosphere. This creates layers, mostly within the thermosphere, that can reflect radio waves from the Earth's surface. These layers, together, are sometimes called the ionosphere. We can take advantage of them to bounce radio signals all around the Earth. Which is very helpful for our radio communication.

C - Mind/Concept Mapping

Try breaking down a topic into a web of linked ideas. e.g.



The process of producing a mind map is effective at linking concepts and embedding ideas into memory. Once the mind map is produced it becomes a good resource to refer to in further revision.


D - Using Revision Resources

Many departments will recommend a particular revision guide and/or workbook. Many are on sale at Parents' evening or available through school at discounted prices. Directors of subject will provide information next week re the purchasing of guides through their department. If purchasing other revision guides please be careful to make sure that they match the exam board and specification your child will be sitting. Each subject has listed which revision guides are best suited for their exams in this document.

E - Past Papers/Exam Question practice

Research has shown this to be the most effective form of revision in terms of boosting grades. Past papers will be available through school departments and are also free to download online from exam board websites. Mark schemes and examiners comments are also available which can show where students have made common mistakes.

A quick internet search for the exam board and past papers will normally lead to past papers. e.g.



If you have any trouble finding past papers, please contact the relevant department for advice.

In the in the individual subject revision section after this each subject has stated which exam board they are sitting.

F - Organisation

Students should have a lever arch file for every subject that they are taught. This should include a revision checklist and notes/revision material for that subject. The more organised you are, the easier it is to complete effective revision, concentrating on the key topics that you need to improve upon.

Common student statements - True or False

'I have no work to do' – False – There is plenty of revision to be getting on with on each subject's home revision programme.

'I need regular breaks' – True – Revision is much more effective when done in intense bursts with short breaks in between.

'No-one else has started revising yet' – False – Some students started their exam preparation in year 10.

'I need time away from studies to relax' – True – Students need to stay relaxed in order to be receptive to revision. Some time spent doing sports and hobbies can be helpful.

'I can revise and watch TV' – False – Studies have shown that trying to revise while following a TV programme is very unsuccessful. Quiet background music can be helpful, but loud music and screens make revision ineffective.

'Revision is just reading over your notes' – False – Just reading notes is an ineffective way to revise. To make the information stick the mind needs to process the information and make links.

'It's too early to start revising' – False – It's never too early. Starting early will allow you to get through all the material in plenty of time avoiding last minute panic!

What can parents/guardians do to help?

- Help your child to get in the right frame of mind
- Be ready for stress stay calm and help them deal with it
- Help your child plan revision
- Agree a reasonable revision programme and help them stick to it
- Provide a quiet calm environment for them to revise in
- Provide plenty of food and drink, treats and rewards
- Provide resources revision guides / stationery / past exam papers and mark schemes
- Be overwhelmingly positive

What can students do to help themselves?

Maximise your attendance

- If in doubt over illness get to school
- Be punctual
- Late arrivals miss key lesson starters
- Attend all revision and intervention sessions
- Exam tips from teachers can make all the difference
- Revise at home
- Make a reasonable revision programme and stick to it
- Take responsibility for your own success

Subject: English

Course details

Both English Language and Literature is taught at Castle View Enterprise Academy which gives students two GCSEs. Both English Language and Literature are linear examination courses. English Language follows the Eduqas specification and English Literature; Edexcel.

English Language:

Reading and writing are equally assessed across both papers. Reading and Writing sections are worth 40 marks each.

<u>Paper 1</u>- 1 hour and 45 minutes: C20th Literature Reading and Creative Prose Writing (40% of the overall GCSE)

<u>Paper 2</u>- 2 hours: 19th and 21st Century Non-Fiction Reading and Transactional Writing (60% of the overall GCSE)

<u>Non-exam assessment</u>: Students are to complete a compulsory spoken language unit to support the English Language GCSE. This assesses oracy and is completed and assessed in school.

English Literature:

All assessments are closed book, and all assessments are compulsory. Pupils are to read and analyse all texts fully and respond critically to the reading.

<u>Paper 1</u>- 1 hr and 45 Minutes: Shakespeare and Post-1914 Literature. The total amount of marks available is 80. (50% of the overall GCSE)

<u>Paper 2</u>- 2 hours and 15 minutes: 19th-century Novel and Poetry since 1789. The total amount of marks available is 80. (50% of the overall GCSE)

Best way to revise in mathematics:

The best way to revise for maths is to do maths; attempt questions and exam papers.

Start by identifying the topics you know you need a bit more work on (your teacher will guide you in this as to the most appropriate topics), try the questions on mathsgenie (or Corbett maths) and then check your answers. Each topic has a revision video attached to it which will go through each topic in a similar style to your teacher. Then re-attempt the questions and again mark.

Use the same method for past exam papers, attempt the questions first, then revise the topics that you aren't sure on, then re-attempt.

There are numerous formulae and facts that must be memorised for exams and the best way is to test yourself using flashcards.

Make sure you are covering not just the topics you can do, any topic could appear on your exams and you need to be ready for all topics. Your teacher will help guide your revision to specific topics, but if you find a topic covered in lessons isn't quite sorted yet use mathsgenie to help boost your understanding.

Never just read a completed question, copy out a question on a separate sheet and attempt the question whilst covering the answers. Then check your work.





Best way to revise in GCSE History

Know the Big Picture The best way to aid your understanding of history is to make sure you are confident with the big 'overview' story before you begin revising individual topics.

1.Create a timeline to identify the key events in a topic and colour code the themes. E.g. Expansionism and Nuclear Arms Race 2. Mapping out what you can remember about a topic before you start, e.g. The treatment of disease through time or the Weimar Republic 1919-1929

Flashcards Simply create with questions on side and answers on the other side. You can colour code for specific topics and quiz yourself or others. Post its can be also useful for key words and timelines. You can also create excellent flashcards online or on your phone using Quizlet which also had an app. You can also create flashcards using the Leitner Method: How to study flashcards using the Leitner system



Cornell Note taking This is a system for taking, organising and reviewing notes and has been devised by Prof. Walter Pauk of Cornell University in the 1950s. It requires very little preparation which makes it ideal for note taking in class. The page will be divided into 4 — or sometimes only 3 — different sections: Two columns, one area at the bottom of the page, and one smaller area at the top of the page. The smaller column on the left side is for questions about the notes that can be answered when reviewing and keywords or comments that make the whole reviewing and exam preparation process easier. When reviewing the notes, a brief summary of every page should be written into the section at the bottom.

Retrieval Practice Testing what you know is a powerful tool in revision, the effort to remember something really strengthens your memory Apps such as Memrise and Quizlet allow you to use or create your own quizzes based on topics. Create them, test yourself or get someone to test you, it's works!

Transform Information into graphic organisers These are a great way of 'transforming' your notes/information into visual revision topics. They can be used to create links, show a narrative, identify

the causes/consequences and importance of something. For history; Causation – Create a visual flow diagram of the chronological events in a time period e.g. Cold War 2. Change and Continuity – Create a Venn diagram to show what changed and did not in medical time period 3. Concept Mapping – At the end of a week, mind map all you can remember about a topic and link area together. Then add to your mind map using a different colour using notes.

Dual coding is the method of putting your knowledge into visual form alongside words. It increases the chances of you remembering it e.g. putting the events of the Spanish Armada or the Munich Putsch 1923 into a cartoon strip. 1. Use simple drawings with matching simple descriptions 2. The drawing should represent your understanding of the topic 3. Try to draw links between images

Interleaving and Spacing Don't revise your all topics in one go (cramming), you should revise 'chunks' of a topic for small amounts of time (15 minutes) and then move onto another 'chunk' from a different topic. This will improve your memory! e.g. 15 minutes on Medicine, then Germany then Cold War 1. Create a revision plan to cover topics you need to cover (least confident first!) and then go back over them again later. Spread out your learning in small sections, 5 hours to 5 x 1 hour 2. Use your flashcards to self-test yourself on old and new topics, self-testing across these





Best way to revise in GCSE PE:

- Create flash cards for all key topic areas so that you can learn all the essentials and read over these regularly.
- Make use of Memorise weekly to recap and learn key words.
- Read your revision guide topic by topic and complete the related exam questions after each topic has been revised. Any questions you get incorrect you must then complete revision on that topic again.
- Complete regular mock exam questions to practice your exam writing skills and apply your knowledge.






Paper 1: Listening 25%. Answering questions and responding to information played over the loud speaker. All questions will be in Spanish. Students listen to a recording and answer questions about what they hear.

Paper 2: Speaking 25%. This exam comprises of 3 elements. It begins with a Role Play, is followed by a picture task based on 1 Theme and ends with General Conversation. The conversation section will cover the remaining 2 Themes. This will be the first paper students will complete.

Paper 3: Reading and Translation into English 25%. Reading comprehension – questions will be in Spanish and English. Where questions are asked in Spanish the candidate will answer in Spanish. There will be a translation task from Spanish into English.

Paper 4: Writing and translation into Spanish 25%. At Foundation Tier candidates will have to describe a picture in Spanish, compose 2 pieces of writing (40 words and 90 words) based around bullet point tasks and translate English sentences into Spanish. At Higher tier there are 3 tasks: 2 extended written pieces (90 and 150 words) and the translation of a paragraph into Spanish.

Best way to revise for the Listening exam

The best way to improve listening skills is through exposure to spoken Spanish. This can be via television programmes and films in Spanish with the Spanish subtitles on. This will also improve your intonation and spoken Spanish!

Try to watch the programme without English subtitles – then re-watch with subtitles on and see how well you understand.

Another way is to listen to Past Paper MP3 recordings with and without the transcript. Try to write down what is being said. This method allows you to make links between the written and spoken word and will increase your confidence!

Use BBC bitesize to do some listening practice questions

Regularly learn your vocabulary

Best way to revise for the Speaking exam

Ensure you have prepared and memorised your presentation for the general conversation

Ensure that your class teacher has marked your pre-written general conversation answers, so you are learning them accurately

Practise roleplay scenarios and photocard questions – you can access past papers on the pearson edexcel website. Ask your teacher for an additional roleplay / photocard booklet

Have a positive attitude! Everyone is nervous about this exam but don't worry!

Best way to revise for the Reading exam

Regular learning of topic vocabulary and recognising Mat structures such as tenses and especially time phrases (last year, tomorrow etc.) will really boost your chances of success in this. Practise translation into English.
